Ordinary Time returns today, but the Christmas season is recalled with the use of responsorial Psalm 96, a common psalm from the Christmas calendar. In *Sing to the Lord* (Collegeville, MN: Liturgical Press, 1993) Benedictine Sister Irene Nowell writes: "All we need to remember on this Sunday is to sing praise. We see the signs of God's salvation right before our eyes.... We borrow the prophet's words to shout our joy at the beginning of Jesus' ministry" (p. 177). "Songs of Thankfulness and Praise" (TM 91; BB 108) in the music suggestions recalls the Christmas stories and celebrates the initiation of Christ's ministry at Cana in verse 2.

Worship magazine (September 8, Vol. 82, No. 5) called Stephen Dean's collection *Holy Gifts* (OCP 20377TL) exciting and versatile. Within the collection is a setting of Psalm 96 (www.ocp.org/songs/77564). Felician Sister Judith Kubicki says that "'Proclaim the Wonders of the Lord' is one of the most lively and challenging pieces in the collection. It is syncopated, with dissonant harmonies, and festive brass accompaniment—just that kind of piece that makes the sacrifices associated with belonging to a choir well worth the effort. The song calls for two cantors and has two endings. The first is quiet, to be used when the piece is sung as a responsorial psalm. The second is a festive ending when the psalm is used as a processional" (p. 462). If it's too late for this year, put it on your wish list for next year.

The music suggestions celebrate Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday tomorrow by featuring traditional spirituals, gospel-style music, and music by contemporary black composers.

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Ritual Notes

The *Collection of Masses of the Blessed Virgin Mary: Sacramentary* (Liturgical Press, 800-858-5450, litpress.org) has a preface for “Our Lady of Cana” (P9) that offers a beautiful proclamation of the theology behind today’s Gospel. If one were to use it today, the line “on this celebration of the glorious Virgin Mary” would need to be omitted, and the “she” at the beginning of the second line in the second paragraph would be replaced with “the Virgin Mary.”

Take Me Home: Notes on the Church Year for Children (Liturgy Training Publications, 800-933-1800, ltp.org) has a reproducible page for Monday’s Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is observed from January 18 to January 25 (the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul). For weekday Masses during this week, consider using the first form of the Eucharistic Prayer for Masses for Various Needs and Occasions (“The Church on the Way to Unity”) and the prayers “For Unity of Christians” in the “Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Occasions” section in the *Sacramentary* (13).

Catholic Household Blessings and Prayers, Revised Edition (364; USCCB Publishing, 800-235-8722, usccb.org) has a prayer for Christian unity for home use, and *Prayer Services for Parish Life* (88-90; World Library Publications, 800-566-6150, wlpmusic.com) has a “Service for Christian Unity” that could be used for an ecumenical gathering this coming week.

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WEDDING GIFTS

The Lord likes weddings. Scripture presents the Lord as a bridegroom delighting in his bride: us. At Cana, Jesus, his mother and his disciples were guests at a wedding. When the couple needed help, Jesus creatively showed his glory. The last wine turned out to be the best. God’s Spirit shares gifts with us for very good reasons. We receive the gifts with joy and use them for salvation. Being a guest at this great wedding can change everything.
