Today's column continues with excerpts from Pope Benedict's 2009 Easter Vigil homily:

"The second symbol of the Easter Vigil...is water. It appears in Sacred Scripture, and hence also in the inner structure of the Sacrament of Baptism, with two opposed meanings. On the one hand there is the sea, which appears as a force antagonistic to life on earth, continually threatening it; yet God has placed a limit upon it....And so it becomes the symbolic representation of Jesus' death on the Cross: Christ descended into the sea, into the waters of death, as Israel did into the Red Sea. Having risen from death, he gives us life. This means that Baptism is not only a cleansing, but a new birth: with Christ we, as it were, descend into the sea of death, so as to rise up again as new creatures. The other way in which we encounter water is in the form of the fresh spring that gives life, or the great river from which life comes forth. According to the earliest practice of the Church, Baptism had to be administered with water from a fresh spring. Without water there is no life. It is striking how much importance is attached to wells in Sacred Scripture. They are places from which life rises forth. Beside Jacob's well, Christ spoke to the Samaritan woman of the new well, the water of true life. He reveals himself to her as the new, definitive Jacob, who opens up for humanity the well that is awaited: the inexhaustible source of life-giving water (cf. John 4:5-15)."

# Fourth Sunday of Lent

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### **Ritual Notes**

by Paul Covino, from Today's Liturgy 2010

The second scrutiny (*RCIA* 164–170) is celebrated at Mass today. The "Ritual Masses" section of the *Sacramentary* provides an opening prayer, prayer over the gifts, and prayer after Communion for the second scrutiny, as well as inserts for Eucharistic Prayer I (pp. 826–828). As with the penitential rite for candidates on the Second Sunday of Lent, pay particular attention to the placement of the catechumens, the proclamation of the intercessions, and the laying on of hands with the scrutinies on these three Sundays.

Today is also known as "Laetare Sunday" because of the entrance antiphon for this Sunday in the *Sacramentary*, which begins with the words "Rejoice (in Latin, *Laetare*), Jerusalem!" (p. 106). The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* grants a midseason break from Lent's austerity on this Sunday by allowing flowers at the altar (305) and the use of rose-colored vestments "where it is the practice" (346f). See Peter Mazar's notes about Laetare Sunday, as well as his suggestions for decorating the church throughout Lent, in *To Crown the Year: Decorating the Church through the Seasons* (42-72; OCP 10640, 800-LITURGY, ocp.org).
