We continue on our theological journey to Jerusalem with the story of the lepers. The one who returns to give thanks is a Samaritan, one disliked by the Jews. This is one of three stories involving Samaritans (the others are the story of the Good Samaritan and the story of the woman at the well), making the faith stories even more significant because of the political and religious conflict between these peoples.

Musicianship Basics (Continued from last week.)

The essential elements of music rehearsals are the same as the very definition of what Church is: 1) the word of God must be proclaimed; 2) it should be an educational experience; 3) an experience of community is fostered; and 4) there is a sense of mission. Learning the language of music can contribute to that educational aspect.

Identifying Major Keys (There is no consistency between approaches, but each works!):

- 1) To determine a major key with sharps in the signature, go to the last sharp on the right, then go up one half step (check the keyboard), and that is the name of the major scale. If there are no sharps or flats, it is in C major or A minor. (More on the minor keys later.)
- 2) To determine a major key with flats in the signature, the next to the last flat *is* the name of the key. This works except for F major, which only has one flat.
- 3) You won't find sharps and flats mixed together in the key signature. Sometimes the last note of a piece is part of the "home" chord; if the key signature and the last note or chord don't coincide, the piece may be in a minor key.

In 1971, the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC, opened with the premier performance of *Mass*, a theatre piece for singers, players and dancers composed by Leonard Bernstein. The refrain of one of the songs—"You cannot imprison the Word of the Lord"—is a variation of a line that appears in today's second reading ("the word of God is not chained"). In a similar way, it is often said that the role of homilists is to "unchain" or "break open" God's word, that is, to invite the assembly into the stories and the message of the readings and, through them, to help members of the assembly see the presence of God in their lives. Surveys and anecdotal conversations confirm that Catholics are eager for this kind of preaching. There are many excellent books, journals and

Web sites (including Liturgy.comTM) that offer assistance and examples for preparing to preach on each Sunday and feast day during the liturgical year, and everyone who preaches should have access to some of these. Given the importance of preaching, those who preach would also do well to take advantage of workshops and conferences that seek to nurture a preacher's skills, like the Catholic Coalition on Preaching Convocation that will be held September 24–27, 2008, in Louisville, Kentucky.
