#### **ENTRANCE ANTIPHON**

Revelation 5:12; 1:6

The Lamb who was slain is worthy to receive strength and divinity, wisdom and power and honor: to him be glory and power for ever.

Because David was so loved as a leader, the elders of all the tribes anointed him king of Israel at Hebron. King David shepherded the people from then on.

#### SECOND READING

Colossians 1:12-20

God's Son brought the people into the reign of forgiveness and love. He heads the body, the church, and has primacy in all things, making peace through the blood of his cross.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is to come!

#### **COMMUNION ANTIPHON**

The Lord will reign for ever and will give his people the gift of peace.

This feast is relatively new. Pope Pius XI (1922–1939) created it in 1925. Attempting to ward off communism and atheism, he declared this solemnity where Christ is declared Lord of all creation.

Many know Sister of Mercy Suzanne Toolan from her classic hymn, "I Am the Bread of Life" (BB/MI 338). Not as many know of her work with Catherine's Center, a California safe house for women just out of prison. For many years, she has collaborated with the Brothers of Taizé, composing music that brings people together—regardless of denomination—in contemplative prayer. I've attended her large (500+) Taizé Prayer on First Fridays at their mercy center in Burlingame, California. She was instrumental in bringing together the work of over thirty-five composers in Hear the Prayers that Rise. Included are familiar ostinatos, canons, rounds, acclamations and litanies in over thirty new songs. There is an assembly book (OCP 20214TL), accompaniment book (OCP 20215TL) and multi-CD set (OCP 20213TL). Most helpful is the solo instrument book (OCP 20216TL). These pieces can also be used during Mass and are very effective at Communion.

Musicianship Basics (Continued from last week.)

Here's a very practical application for transposition. Look at "Gift of Finest Wheat" (*BB/MI* 336). What is the key? Yes, five flats, Db major. You can also read this in D major with two sharps. It will be easier for students to read in D major than Db major. Be prepared to adjust for accidentals.

Today's Mass prayers are found at the end of the "Solemnities of the Lord during Ordinary Time" section of the Sacramentary, and the readings are labeled "Last Sunday in Ordinary Time" at the end of the "Proper of Seasons and Ordinary Time" section of the Sunday Lectionary. There is a preface (P51) for today's solemnity in the Sacramentary. Similar to the greetings for various occasions in the Book of Blessings, the greeting today might echo some of the imagery from the solemnity, such as "The grace and peace of God our Father, who conferred upon Christ Jesus sovereignty over every age and nation, be with you always" or "May the peace of Christ, the King of kings, be with you all." See the suggested invocations for form C of the penitential rite in Prayer of the Faithful 2007

(OCP PF-071TL, 800-LITURGY, ocp.org). Consider using incense to highlight this last Sunday of the liturgical year. A fragrant, high-quality incense is available from the Holy Rood Guild (866-383-7292, holyroodguild.com).
