Welcome! ¡Bienvenidos! Chào mung! Especially to our new subscribers. May the grace of Jesus, the love of God, and the wisdom of the Holy Spirit be with all as we begin this new liturgical year in service to our Lord and to our worshipping communities.

This year in the Church's three-year cycle of Lectionary readings we will be hearing the Gospel according to Matthew on a semi-continuous basis. While not the oldest Gospel (that distinction belongs to Mark's Gospel), it is considered the most Jewish of the four. It is chronological and begins by tracing the lineage of Jesus back to Abraham, the patriarch of the Old Testament. Matthew labors to connect the events in Jesus' life as the fulfillment of Old Testament writings. His writings focus on two areas: 1) showing that Jesus is the Christ (the anointed one, the equivalent of the Jewish messiah) and 2) the coming of the kingdom as proclaimed by Christ.

In today's first reading, Isaiah tells us of Jerusalem as it will be in the future. The assembly responds to those words with the response from Psalm 122: "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord." (The house of the Lord is the temple in Jerusalem.) Though we often think of today's Gospel as a warning, it may also be interpreted as a reassurance of Jesus' second coming.

Note that December 1st is World AIDS Day. Resources for observing this day are available on the National Catholic AIDS Network's Web site, ncan.org.

A new liturgical year begins today, and we return to the Gospel of Saint Matthew. The brief commentaries in *The Gospel According to Matthew* by Jesuit Father Daniel Harrington and Dominican Sister Barbara Reid (The Liturgical Press, 800-858-5450, litpress.org) are good resources for homilists and others who prepare the liturgy.

When preparing for Advent, remember the focus for the season that is outlined in the *General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar:* "Advent has a twofold character: as a season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation" (39).

An Advent wreath that is in scale for a worship space can highlight the imagery of light that appears in today's alternative opening prayer, first reading, second reading, and solemn blessing. See Peter Mazar's ideas for creating and placing an effective wreath in the worship space in *To Crown the Year: Decorating the Church Through the Seasons* (222-28; OCP 10640TL, 800-LITURGY, ocp.org). Chapter 47 of the *Book of Blessings* (The Liturgical Press) provides two forms for the blessing of an Advent wreath, and *Catholic Household Blessings and Prayers* (110-12; USCCB Publishing, 800-235-8722, usccb.org) has a similar blessing for home use.
