From now through the Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time the Gospels proclaim the Sermon on the Mount. With apologies to Eugene Peterson, I would like to paraphrase from his work, *The Message*. He offers a contemporary spin on the Beatitudes to spark our imaginations.

1) The poor in spirit = those at the end of their ropes: “With less of you there is more of God.” 2) Those who mourn = those who feel they’ve lost everything: “Only then can you be embraced by the One most dear to you.” 3) The meek = those content with who they are: “you are proud owners of everything that can’t be bought.” 4) Those who hunger and thirst = those who’ve worked up an appetite for God: “He’s food and drink in the best meal you’ll ever eat.” 5) The merciful = those who care: “At the moment of being ‘care-full,’ you find yourselves ‘cared for.’” 6) The pure of heart = those who are working to get mind and heart put right: “Then you can see God in the outside world.” 7) The peacemakers = those who show people how to cooperate and not fight: “That’s when you discover who you really are, and your place in God’s family.” 8) The persecuted = those who suffer because of their commitment to God: “It means that the truth is too close for comfort and they are uncomfortable with you.... My prophets and witnesses have always gotten into this kind of trouble.”

This Friday, February 11, is World Day of the Sick. Musicians might consider a visit to a nursing home to sing and make music with the residents.

Matthew 5:13–16

Jesus called his disciples the “salt of the earth” and “the light of the world.” He cautioned them not to let the salt lose its flavor and not to put a cover on the light but to let it shine. “Your light must shine before others...and glorify your heavenly Father.”

COMMUNION ANTIPHON

Psalm 106:8–9

Give praise to the Lord for his kindness, for his wonderful deeds toward men. He has filled the hungry with good things, he has satisfied the thirsty.

Ritual Notes

Today's first reading, psalm, and Gospel connect the imagery of light to the practice of both charity and justice. In his first encyclical, Pope Benedict XVI made it clear that "the Church cannot neglect the service of charity any more than she can neglect the Sacraments and the Word" (#22, *Deus Caritas Est*, available at zenit.org/article-15096?l=English). In a more recent encyclical, the Pope went on to say that "justice is inseparable from charity, and intrinsic to it" (#6, *Caritas in Veritate*, available at zenit.org/article-26386?l=English). For a fuller account of the Church's social teaching, see the *Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church*, which is available in a printed volume (USCCB Publishing, 800-235-8722, usccb.org) and online (vatican.va/phome_en.htm, type "compendium social doctrine" in the search window).

In *Deus Caritas Est*, Pope Benedict made particular reference to the involvement of young people in charitable volunteer work, noting that "this widespread involvement constitutes a school of life which offers them a formation in solidarity and in readiness to offer others not simply material aid but their very selves" (#30b). Invite young people in your community to participate in service learning experiences based in Catholic social teaching such as Young Neighbors in Action for high school students and Just5Days for middle school students (cmdnet.org). Encourage college students to check out the Catholic Network of Volunteer Service (cnvs.org) for an overview of post-graduate, faith-based volunteer opportunities.

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SALT AND LIGHT

Paul tells us that he came not with oratory or philosophy, but simply to tell what God had guaranteed. Paul also wrote that our faith should not depend on human philosophy but on the power of God. He is not anti-intellectual, but he puts "first things first." Our salvation comes by God's initiative of love through our crucified Messiah, Jesus. We are also told we are "salt" and "light" before all, meant to change the flavor of the world and show ourselves and others the way in Christ. How goes it with you?
