The connection between Moses on Mount Sinai and Jesus' Sermon on the Mount will be very obvious today if the long form of the Gospel is proclaimed.

Surely a strong hymn/song stays in people's brains (hearts?) for some time after the actual event. Tunes have a special way of lingering in us. In his bestseller *Musicophilia: Tales of Music and the Brain* (NY: Alfred A. Knopf, 2007), physician Oliver Sacks calls the phenomenon "brainworms."

That being said, I urge you to look at a new selection, "In Christ Alone" (BB/MI 525) by Keith Getty and Stuart Townend. It's one of those melodies I just couldn't get out of my head. Written in 2002 by the son of an English clergyman, it was a hit in England even before the Newsboys created their version. One indication of a good melody is that it is memorable. If that is the criteria, this hymn qualifies! A melody must be singable, too, if it is to be used for worship. Communities of all ages can sing and play "In Christ Alone." However, the strength of the song is really in its theology. An Air Force chaplain told me it is popular with those in our Armed Forces. It's sure to be one of your favorites, too!

Today is the eve of Valentine's Day. Because there is so little known about St. Valentine, he was removed from the liturgical calendar in 1969 but is still on the official list of saints (Martyrology). To give the celebration a renewed Christian perspective, consider using "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" today.

#### **Ritual Notes**

The longer form of today's Gospel includes the word "Raqa." This is an Aramaic term of abuse equivalent to "imbecile" or "blockhead." An easy way to find this kind of information about the Scripture readings is to check the footnotes for each chapter of the Bible at usccb.org (click "Bible" at the top of the page, click the book of the Bible and the chapter from which the reading is taken, scroll down to the footnotes).

The Introduction to the *Lectionary* contains important theological insights and practical information about the readings in the *Lectionary* and their proclamation in the liturgy. Available at the front of the *Lectionary* and in *The Liturgy Documents: Volume One, Fourth Edition* (119-162; Liturgy Training Publications, 800-933-1800, ltp.org), it is a document that should be familiar to those who prepare the community's liturgy. In reference to the length of Scripture texts in the *Lectionary*, the Introduction notes that "a middle way is followed" that distinguishes "between narratives that require reading a fairly long passage but which usually hold the attention of the faithful, and texts that should not be lengthy because of the profundity of their doctrine." It goes on to note that "in the case of certain rather lengthy texts, longer and shorter versions are provided to suit different situations" (#75). Today's Gospel is an example of a reading for which a longer and shorter version are provided.

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## **TOUGH LOVE**

The law of Christ based on godly love does not supplant a law based on justice. It goes further. It demands the living out of what we say in the Lord's Prayer: "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Isn't this "hard bargain" really the "tough love" of the Holy Trinity? Beginning always with love, God calls, encourages, and strengthens us to share the great mystery of divine life. By our actions we express our answer to God's call.

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
