Today the disciples James and John ask Jesus if they might sit next to him in the kingdom. Read his response to them in the Gospel. I'm certain pastoral musicians will be seated at least nearby after what you've been through in Jesus' name!

Remember the fruits of the Holy Spirit? They're listed thus in the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*: "He who has grafted us onto the true vine will make us bear 'the fruit of the Spirit: ...love [charity], joy, peace, patience, kindness [benignity], goodness, faithfulness [long-suffering], gentleness [mildness], self-control" (736; Galatians 5:22–23). Yes, there used to be twelve fruits, but only nine in the Catechism! The missing three are modesty, continence, and chastity, all of which are probably covered by "self-control." They're the result of the Holy Spirit dwelling within a person. They are manifested in so many music ministers.

You are truly amazing! Some of you sing, play organ or piano, train children's choirs, lead contemporary groups, direct adult choirs, teen choirs, children's choirs, bell choirs, and manage a budget, the pastor, other ministers, and often a spouse and family. I'm sure you'll say, "Not always very well." But it is clear that the Spirit radiates from within you. If you don't agree, perhaps God is calling you elsewhere. Be open.

This season in church musicians' lives can be a very trying time. There are liturgy meetings, music rehearsals, ministry fairs, recruitment campaigns, special Masses, and potluck suppers. Often you are expected to either be present or provide some musical resources. Remain calm. Learn to live with the fact that you may never get caught up—and it's okay!

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Ritual Notes

World Mission Sunday is observed in many communities today. While the readings of the day may not be changed, the *Sacramentary* provides Mass texts “For the Spread of the Gospel” (#14, under Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Occasions) which may be used “whenever there are special celebrations for the missions, even on Sundays of Ordinary Time.” *Redemptoris Missio*, the 1990 encyclical on mission by Pope John Paul II, is available at vatican.va/edocs/ENG0219/_INDEX.HTM. A summary of the encyclical is available from *Catholic Update* (#C1091, St. Anthony Messenger Press, 800-488-0488, americancatholic.org).

A growing number of missionaries are lay women and men (including married couples) and missionary experiences now include programs lasting one or two years, such as the Jesuit Volunteer Corps (jesuitvolunteers.org) and Rostro de Cristo (rostrodecristo.org). Don't forget to include these “new faces” of Catholic missionary work when preaching and catechizing for World Mission Sunday. Get young people in your community thinking about the possibility of serving in a short-term mission or volunteer experience after college. *Connections* (The St. Vincent Pallotti Center for Apostolic Development, pallotticenter.org) and *Response* (Catholic Network of Volunteer Service, cnvs.org) are free annual directories of faith based volunteer opportunities across the country and around the world. Distribute copies to high school and college students, as well as other young adults, in your community. The US Catholic Mission Association (202-884-9764, uscatholicmission.org) is another helpful resource.

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RESPECT

“The one who wants to be great among you must be your servant, even the slave of all.” For Christians, to lead is to be “of service to others,” a complicated and difficult task. It is too easy (and un-Christian) to demand respect, to lord it over others. The Messiah-Christ is the suffering servant who “justifies many, taking their faults on himself.” So Jesus washed his disciples’ feet. Jesus knows and feels our weakness from his own experience. We then can have confidence in his help for us.
