As we approach the end of the liturgical year, the sense of urgency about Christ's return in glory increases in the readings of the liturgy. The feasts of All Saints, All Souls, and, soon, Our Lord Jesus Christ the King help focus our minds and spirits on the end times. It is the season of the communion of saints. *Día de los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) is a Mexican tradition that sets time aside to pray for loved ones who have died. They fused an ancient Aztec celebration of honoring ancestors with the Christian ones that celebrate the communion of saints.

Day of the Dead is celebrated on both November 1 (for deceased children) and 2 (for deceased adults). For more information on the history and customs, go to dayofthedeath.com.

Many Catholic parishes remember deceased loved ones with a Book of Remembrance where, during November, parishioners enter names of their loved ones. In some parishes, members also place photos of their deceased loved ones around the baptismal font, near the altar, or a side altar. It is a very faith-filled symbol of the communion of saints. One of the interesting Day of the Dead customs is the building of home shrines called *ofrendas* (offerings) that can include photos, food, flowers, and favorite symbols of the life of the deceased relatives. Consider creating an *ofrenda* in your home in November. Scattered mementos become more effective when clustered in one place, invoking wonderful story-telling moments for all.

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Ritual Notes

Many Protestant communities celebrate Reformation Sunday today. Include a petition in the prayer of the faithful for our Protestant brothers and sisters who are one with us in baptism, and for the ongoing work of bringing about unity among the various Christian churches. Consider using the preface for Christian unity (P76) today.

In today's Gospel, Jesus heals the blind man Bartimaeus. Does your community have resources to offer to blind Catholics? There is a Yahoo group for Blind Catholics that can be accessed by going to bvi-groups.tripod.com/religion.htm. The Xavier Society for the Blind (212-473-7800) provides free Catholic magazines and books in Braille or on tape to people who are blind. Braille Bibles can be purchased at braillebookstore.com/view.php?C=Bibles. Consider incorporating Braille type when replacing signs in parish facilities. See the section on "Welcoming a Person Who Is Blind or Has Visual Impairment" in *That All May Worship: An Interfaith Welcome to People with Disabilities* (23-24; National Organization on Disability, 202-293-5960, nod.org).

Halloween is this coming Saturday. Considered by some a pagan holiday, it is for Catholics "the holy eve of All Saints' Day [when] we begin the church's month to remember the dead" (*Take Me Home: Notes on the Church Year for Children*, Liturgy Training Publications, 800-933-1800, ltp.org). Distribute the reproducible page on "All Hallows" from this book at Mass today and in Catholic elementary schools and religious education classes this week.

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CRY OUT!

"Son of David, Jesus, have mercy on me!"
"Master, let me see." "Go, your faith has saved you." We, too, need to see God's works around us. Our initiation into God's family (our baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist) gives us insight into the truth, but often we want to be blind to what we see. We need to shout out loud like Bar-Timaeus, crying out in prayer and in faith for assurance. The plan shown to us by Jesus will save us if we follow where he leads. Come quickly, Lord Jesus!
