Martyr, from the Greek word meaning "witness," refers to someone who would rather die than give up firmly held convictions.

The first saints to be venerated by the early Church were those who were martyred for the faith. By the middle of the third century, local churches had lists of martyrs and confessors that included their dates of death and burial places. We know confessors as priests who hear confessions but in the early Church a confessor was a person who suffered for the faith yet did not die a martyr. After that, ascetics—those who lived a life of self-denial—were considered holy. Next in order of importance were consecrated virgins and bishops. Widows who served the Church were considered ascetics and, thus, also saints. All this happened before there was an official process for canonization in the Church. For interesting background on the latter, see Making Saints: How the Catholic Church Determines Who Becomes a Saint, Who Doesn't, and Why, by Kenneth Woodward (New York: Touchstone, 1996). Another recommendation is Jesuit Father James Martin's My Life with the Saints (Chicago: Loyola Press, 2006). It deserves mention every year.

For organ processional hymns, "For All the Saints" (BB/MI 736) is given priority in the music suggestions because of its traditional popularity. It only became popular in the Roman Catholic Church, however, after the Second Vatican Council. If the homilist preaches about the cult of the saints, consider "Blessed Feasts of Blessed Martyrs" (BB/MI 735) at preparation or dismissal.

Ritual Notes

Since it falls on a Sunday this year, the solemnity of All Saints replaces the 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time. Today's Mass prayers are in the "Proper of Saints" section in the *Sacramentary*. There is a preface for All Saints (P71), a solemn blessing (18) and two prayers over the people (25, 26). Consider using Eucharistic Prayer I, which names a number of saints. Today's readings are found under "Solemnities and Feasts of the Lord and the Saints" in the Sunday *Lectionary*. The *Lectionary for Masses with Children*, which provides the first reading, responsorial psalm, and Gospel for today's solemnity, may be used if a separate Liturgy of the Word is celebrated with children.

Since baptism signifies incorporation into the communion of saints, today's solemnity is a fitting occasion to celebrate infant baptism. See the excellent suggestions for celebrating infant baptism in *Infant Baptism: A Parish Celebration* (Liturgy Training Publications, 800-933-1800, ltp.org). *Infant Baptism Basics: A Parish Program* (OCP 6083, 800-LITURGY, ocp.org) presents information and a variety of sample handouts for a complete parish baptism program from initial contact with the parents through follow-up after the celebration of baptism. See the online exhibit "Places for Baptism: Ancient and New" by Johan van Parys at www1.georgetown.edu/centers/liturgy/envisionchurch/46607.html. The photographs and accompanying commentary provide great insights for creating a font that is truly worthy of the sacrament that is celebrated there.

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HONORING THE SAINTS

This festival in honor of all the saints is just that: a celebration of all of us, the baptized, living, dead, and yet to come. The readings make clear that this feast is as much about earthly Christians as it is about heavenly ones. "We are God's children now," says 1 John, and Jesus makes clear what it means to be "blessed" in the beatitudes (Gospel and Communion antiphon). Our place among the saints is something we experience now as much as in eternity.

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
